EXCHANGES TO FRANCE & GERMANY

Since last school year 2023-2024 it is possible for students in MYP4 (and exceptionally in MYP5) to participate in an exchange with a French or German school. 15 of our students are participating this year in the exchange with France and have received their exchange partners in October. They will go to their exchange partners in May 25 to spend six nights at their host family and at school and to do cultural excursions in the region near Fécamp (Normandie).

We think it is important to give our students the opportunity to have experiences like this, to be able to make new friends, to experience culture first hand, to improve language skills and to do fun things with friends in another country! As language teachers we have seen that exchanges can lead to friendships for life and more open-mindedness in general. For some students it means learning to be more of a risktaker, too!

Next school year 2025-2026 we hope we will be able to go with more students to France and Germany! We will soon start with the communication around the exchanges for next school year.

INTEGRATED HUMANITIES

This term MYP2 students are learning about biomes and climate. The debatable question, which indeed will be debated in class, is: should humans protect the natural environments at all cost? To come to the debate prepared, students researched the 6 biomes of the Earth and visualized their chosen biome on a poster!

MYP4 students started the year with finding out what it actually is that they are studying in Individuals and Societies (named Integrated Humanities at ISW). They first explored various subjects that are covered by I&S, such as Economics, Psychology, Geography and History. They then chose the subject that they were most interested in and sculpted a research question that enabled them to inform their classmates through an infographic. The results were overwhelmingly impressive and there was much variation in the research questions and infographics.


